




















CELT SPORTS EVENT




St Austell was brimming with excitement as hundreds of local pupils from across the Trust gathered to meet their favourite authors at the St Austell Festival of Children's Literature.







Everyone had a fantastic evening, and we wish our Year 11 students all the very best for the future. A special mention to Miss Gregan for organising such a wonderful event.










Year 11 Leavers Day and Prom.

We are so grateful to each and everyone of them for all that they have done for the children, families and staff of Carclaze and wish them all the best for the future.






Time to say goodbye































